

What Exactly is "Code Enforcement" And Why is it so Important to Our Community

Stroudsburg Borough, like all municipalities, has a Code Enforcement Office with the task of ensuring that many of these Ordinances are followed. This office focuses on Ordinances dealing with property maintenance primarily, but also with the enforcement of the Zoning,



What exactly is Code Enforcement? And why does it matter to you as a resident and to our Borough as a whole? The word "Code" refers to the Borough's Code of Ordinances. An Ordinance is a local law, passed by Borough Council, and the Code is a compilation of all Ordinances passed by Council. Code Enforcement is how the Borough ensures that local laws, or Ordinances, are administered properly.

And what are these Ordinances? They are, generally speaking, rules to designed to make the municipality run smoother and to generally benefit the health and welfare of all residents. These Ordinances run the gamut from how trash is picked up, to how all properties are to be maintained, to where parking is allowed... and just about everything else in-between!

Subdivision and Land Development Ordinances as well.

So, the question remains, "Why is Code Enforcement important?" We are a country of laws, all designed to support the greater good of residents and the community as a whole. Code Enforcement, as it is pertains to property maintenance (and is commonly referred to at the municipal level), is a critical element in maintaining a safe and visually appealing community. It ensures that property owners maintain their properties in a condition that will not affect the property values of neighbors, will not be an eyesore, and will not be a safety and health concern to the community. In the bigger picture, the Borough wants to maintain Stroudsburg as a visually appealing community and one that (Continued on Page 3)

Safety Bollards Protecting Event Participants

Today, the watchword when it comes to public events is safety. Unfortunately, all of us have seen incidents in the news where people with evil intent target large gatherings of people. Unfortunately, this is even happening locally; in August 2022, one person was killed and 17 injured when a car was driven into a crowd at a fundraiser in Berwick., PA. In summer 2022, an Ad-Hoc Council Committee was formed to look at events in the downtown and how to improve the Borough's support of these important activities for our community.

While new procedures were developed and put in place by the Borough for events, the most important issue identified by the committee was improved safety for eventgoers. After researching various options, Borough staff determined the best and least expensive option for improving event safety was removable safety bollards. Bollards are large, carbon steel cylinders that are inserted in sleeves embedded in concrete, stopping vehicles moving up to 35 MPH.

Thanks to a grant from the Pocono Mountains Visitors Bureau, we were able to purchase enough bollards for two of the four intersections leading into Courthouse Square. In 2024, the Borough will purchase and install bollards for the remaining two intersections. Safety is paramount in the 21st Century, and the Borough is on the forefront of providing fun, safe public events for visitors and residents alike.



Ann Street Park Grand Reopening

On Saturday, August 5th, Stroudsburg Borough celebrated the reopening of Ann Street Park after significant renovations. Overlooking the "falls" on McMichael Creek, Ann Street Park is a haven of guiet beauty in our busy downtown. However, after years of use, the park was in need of updates. Funding from several sources was obtained, and work was substantially completed by the grand reopening. Improvements/updates include a thorough cleaning and repainting; new sidewalks; stamped concrete on the two lower levels by the falls; a new wooden deck around the beautiful Gingko tree; and a little library and public art, both Eagle Scout Projects by local Boy Scouts. Still remaining to be completed are the planting of flowers and a new picnic table and bench. The park is now awash with



color, vibrant and inviting!

Our thanks to Representative Tarah Probst, who started this project as Mayor and was instrumental in obtaining the funding to make this project possible. On behalf of the Borough, thank you, Tarah!

A new cornerstone in the Borough's Code Enforcement efforts is the Residential Rental Property Inspection Ordinance, passed at Council's September 5th Meeting and due to go into effect in 2024. This Ordinance mandates inspections of residential rental properties, at a minimum, once every three years. Ordinances that mandate inspections on rental properties are common both regionally and nationally, and are a proven way to assist in property maintenance and beautification efforts.

Everyone at the Borough, elected and appointed officials alike, are dedicated to making our Borough the best municipality it can possibly be. Robust efforts in Code Enforcement are key to success in this endeavor. We ask your support, and patience, in the coming months and years as we work towards this goal.
